

## Year 3 General Homework



Detailed below are some activities that you could complete at home, in addition to the set weekly homework. These suggested activities are **optional** and we **do not** need a record of them.

Note: These activities could also be used in the event of a local lockdown, although we hope that this does not happen!

Practise your multiplication and division facts. The order of Year 3 Turbo Tables quizzes are: **x2, ÷2, x5, ÷5, x10, ÷10, x3, ÷3, x4, ÷4 and x8, ÷8**. In order for you to move onto the next quiz in the sequence, you need to have completed all of the calculations within the 5-minute time limit and they must all be correct, e.g. you cannot move onto ÷5 if you did not get all of your x5 calculations correct. Why not give yourself your own Turbo Tables quiz at home and time how long it takes you to complete it? You will need to set out 18 calculations for each quiz, e.g.

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Ensure that you are confident with your punctuation, e.g. capital letters and full stops. Write a few sentences and get your trusted adult to check them. Your sentences could be about anything you like, such as a short story or a summary of your day. Challenge yourself to include some trickier punctuation, such as proper nouns (which need capitals) or speech marks.

Practise your lovely joined handwriting. 'The quick brown fox jumped over the lazy dog' is a sentence that includes all 26 letters of the alphabet!



Keep reading at home. If you are with a trusted adult, you could practise your comprehension skills by;

- **Predicting** what is going to happen;
- **Questioning** what is happening in the text;
- **Clarifying** any tricky words;
- **Summarising** what you have read.
